Every state, territory and the District of Columbia receives a Mental Health Block (MHBG) Grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), Center for Mental Health Services, to provide community mental health services. Who do these grants target and what can the funds be used for? How do Mental Health Planning Councils connect to MHBGs and how are they different from Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grants (SABG)?

#### THE POWER OF TELLING YOUR STORY

As family leaders we are often called upon to tell our story. When the family movement began, we told our stories to convey to decision makers what we were going through and how desperate we were to help our children. We often use our story strategically to highlight issues and support system change. Over the years and as our children have grown we have learned that our children have their own stories, and as family members we need to respect our children's privacy as we tell our stories. In a world of social media stories travel with the speed of the internet and are difficult to delete. They can have a lasting impact on our children in college, future employment, social relationships, and more.

In partnership with Vanguard and the Caring for Every Child's Mental Health Campaign's Family Council, FREDLA has developed a tip sheet on *The Power of Telling Your Story*.
