

Parent Peer Support Provider Training

Family-run organizations (FROs) have a proven history of successfully hiring, training, supervising and retaining the parent peer support workforce. FROs are specialists in the field of parent peer support, and most have developed training specific to the role of the Parent Peer Support Provider (PPSP) and the PPSP supervisor. In November 2018, FREDLA surveyed local and statewide FROs to compile a list of organizations that offer PPSP training or PPSP Supervisor training curricula to other organizations. These curricula and/or onsite training are available for purchase directly from the FROs.

A number of private consultants or organizations have developed and offer curricula in the area of parent peer support. However, this list only includes curricula developed and offered by family-run organizations. Criteria for inclusion on the list are: 1) the curriculum is developed and owned by a family-run organization and 2) the organization makes it available to other organizations. Contact information is included for each curriculum for more details on purchasing the curriculum or training.*

Regardless of their position or service program, it is important that PPSPs receive training on the core competencies and skills sets of parent peer support. The FREDLA PPS Practice Model offers this essential training, as well as training in effective supervision of the PPSP workforce and coaching for trainers of the Practice Model. The PPS Practice Model provides a framework for the essential functions of a Parent Peer Support Provider, offering training and practicing of skills across the 6 phases of parent peer support: Connect, Discover, Support, Empower, Prepare and Take Care. Each of the phases has a specific focus and accompanying skill sets, and the training involves practicing and reinforcing these skills.

Also covers role of PSP, boundaries, ethics, mandated reporting, navigating all children's systems of care, ACE's & trauma informed care, history of family/consumer movements, cultural competency, meeting skills, presenting the parent/family perspective, importance of self-care, and includes some resources/tools to help the PSP provide specific support/education and more.

The focus is on child outcomes (e.g., participation in school, safety at home). The training provides strategies to promote parent engagement across 10 categories and increase in parent skills in seven key areas: Persistent, Articulate, Resourceful, Expectant, Networking, Transparent and Strategic (PARENTS). The training, delivered by family leaders under the direction of Dr. Jane Adams, includes instruction in the use and administration of the on-line modules, "Kids for Keeps" with family clients. The emphasis is on providing services that support parents in their efforts to access services that help their children achieve meaningful outcomes.

It covers all aspects of role from being hired, to understanding the culture of the workplace, referral of a family, intake, person/family centered plan, navigation of service systems and discharge of families. All competencies that are required to provide a family driven approach to family peer support is covered. This five-day training will cover all areas to pass the national certification for parent support providers.
